# **Community Rights**

### DRAFT SCOPE

#### Terms of reference

To examine all aspects of NHDC's policy and processes on community rights as introduced in the Localism Act and suggest improvements if necessary. Specific areas for scrutiny shall include:

- the implications of the Localism Act and the opportunities this brings for the community and the Council;
- the Council's preparedness for dealing with applications and potential impacts on resource availability;
- the effectiveness of the Council's processes:
- provision of information on community rights and management of potential conflicts between decision making and empowerment roles;
- the effectiveness of the Council's engagement with the community and vice versa:
- the challenges, and opportunities for the council;
- comparison with other councils.

The community rights considered shall include:

- The right to bid;
- The right to challenge;
- The right to build;
- Community asset transfer;
- Neighbourhood planning.

#### **Expected Outcomes**

A robust process for publicising community rights and dealing with applications.

#### **Timeframe**

Two stages, timings to be confirmed 1st stage - right to bid and right to challenge 2<sup>nd</sup> stage – other community rights

Working with local communities.
