1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 1.1 To advise the Community Forum on the current expenditure and balances of the Community Grant budget.
- 1.2 To bring to the Forum's attention details of recent requests received for community grant funding, made by community groups and local organisations.
- 1.3 To enable Forum Members to make recommendations to the Executive Member for Community & Partnerships on grant applications.
- 1.4 To advise the Forum of the activities and schemes with which Community & Partnerships officers have been involved in and some important community-based activities that will take place during the next few months.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

THAT THE COMMUNITY FORUM:

- 2.1. Considers and notes the information within this report.
- 2.2. Makes recommendations to the Executive Member for Community & Partnerships on the grant applications detailed below.
- 2.3. Angels Support Group Hitchin £1,063 towards online support groups and workshops for families of children with autism and ADHD.
- 2.4. Creative Chefs £1,612 towards healthy eating cooking sessions for children.
- 2.5. Groundworks East £2,367 towards Grow It, Cook It, Share It course for families.
- 2.6. Royston and District Parkinsons Group £1,092 towards two Sum Up machines and venue hire.

3. BACKGROUND/ RELEVANT CONSIDERATIONS

- 3.1 The Community Grant base budget for Royston Community Forum 2024/25 is £11,001
- **£3,807** has been allocated to date in 2024/25, leaving **£7,194** available for community grants for the Royston area.

4. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

- 4.1 Following the decision of Full Council on 18 April 2023, a Community Forum (formerly Area Forum) shall consider applications for community grants in its area and make recommendations to the Executive Member for Community & Partnerships on them. The Executive Member has delegated authority to make these Executive decisions under section 14.6.8(b)((ii)A 5 of the constitution, in consultation with the Service Director: Legal & Community. That decision will be subject to a 5 clear working day call-in period, following publication in the Members Information Service (MIS) and on the Council's website.
- 4.2 Other issues raised in this report are for information and noting and therefore no direct legal implications arise.

5. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 5.1 As outlined in paragraph 3.2 and detailed in Appendix 1, the available budget is £7,194.
- 5.2 The total amount of funding requested at this meeting is £6,134.
- 5.3 If the applications outlined in Appendices 2, 3, 4 & 5 are recommended by the Forum and subsequently approved by the Executive Member for Community & Partnerships, there will be £1,060 available for Community Grants for the remainder of the 2024-2025 financial year.

6. RISK IMPLICATIONS

- 6.1 Good risk management supports and enhances the decision-making process, increasing the likelihood of the Council meeting its objectives and enabling it to respond quickly and effectively to change. When taking decisions, risks and opportunities must be considered.

Angels Support Group Hitchin provide support and guidance to parents/carers/siblings of children who are diagnosed with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and/or Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and their associated conditions. Based in Hertfordshire, they provide individualised, professional expertise and advice. They work alongside parents to build understanding of their children's conditions, their rights, ensuring their needs are met at home, at school, and in the community. Their key aim is to maximise the individual potential of each child and young person.

They are applying for funding towards their online support groups and workshops for a year, to cover the cost of their Royston-based families. They are also applying to all other Community Forums, to cover the costs of attendees from those areas.

The group run 50 online groups a year comprising of 38 x 2-hour daytime groups and 12 evening online support groups. As the project is run virtually, they can have up to 50 participants per group. Last year 245 parents attended the online support groups, attending an average of three groups over the year. Eighty-two of those parents were from North Herts and 17 of those were from Royston.

They are contributing £348 from fundraising monies and £104 from a National Lottery grant.

The applicant has provided full costs for the whole project for attendees from across Hertfordshire but is only seeking funds from this committee proportionate to how many people from Royston and surrounding villages have attended in previous years.

Creative Chefs CIC provide fun cooking sessions for children. During the sessions children create a healthy recipe (main meal) to take home.

Each child will receive educational information on the importance of making healthy food choices and they will have the opportunity to try seasonal vegetables in the session. The programme invites children to taste, touch and smell the ingredients as the session progresses. This instils a sense of interest in the food they eat and mindfulness while eating. The children will have fun creating a main meal alongside their peers. Each child will receive a recipe booklet to take home with more family friendly recipes for them to try at home with their family. The children will learn skills they can take into adulthood encouraging them to make healthy food choices and reducing health inequalities within the local population.

The service does not finish with the delivery of sessions. They can support families if they have any questions on budget recipes for all the family.

The group have been delivering these sessions throughout North Herts through the Household Support Fund via the North Herts Council and have managed these sessions independently arranging them with schools and reached more than 550 "chefs". Without exception they have had positive feedback with many requests to return. Using seasonal affordable ingredients is both environmentally and economically more sustainable.

The following schools have expressed interest in and been identified for sessions. Ickneid Walk First School Roman Way Academy Tannery Drift First School

Four sessions will be held at each school, reaching a total of 180 children going into year 1 (ages 5 to 6).

Groundwork East takes practical action to create a fair and green future in which people, places, and nature thrive. They support local communities and businesses to build capacity and resilience to tackle hardship, achieve a just transition to net-zero and help nature recover in a way that reduces inequality and leads to better work and healthier, happier lives.

They are applying for funding for their Grow It, Cook It, Share It. Sessions are delivered in person, over six weeks, with two-hour sessions each week. It teaches families how to grow their own fruit and vegetables through supervised gardening and how to prepare healthy meals through simple cooking sessions.

By working together on the practical tasks, and sharing a meal together, families will have the chance to develop their confidence; build friendships and support networks that will last beyond the formal learning environment. By encouraging learners to participate in outdoor practical activities they are also supporting them to improve their physical health and mental wellbeing and that of their whole family.

Courses are delivered by experienced tutors who have practical skills and experience of growing and cooking, as well as working with adult and pre-school children. Course delivery is underpinned by a tried-and-tested quality system. Funding for the course would enable individuals to attend the course free of charge.

The course will take place at Royston & Villages Family Centre, where they have an established partnership and have delivered these courses for a number of years. They predict 20 beneficiaries per course.

Below is a breakdown of the funding they are applying for from the other Community Forums. Costs have been worked out in proportion to how many attendees they expect from each area.

Officer Summary							

Parkinson's UK commissions group all over the country to help and support people living with Parkinson's and their families. One way they support is to get groups to run clubs and sessions based on **Staying Active with Parkinson's**. Last year, North Herts and Stevenage Parkinson's

Group held sessions in Royston aimed at helping the voice with singing and voice exercises. Gradually these became known to others and in the new year it was decided by Parkinson's UK that Royston should become a hub for activities such as the voice sessions. This meant breaking away from the North Herts and Stevenage Group.

The Royston branch host sessions on a Thursday which combine singing with research presentations, discussion groups, taster sessions for Pilates and similar and Q&A sessions with Granta. The group have more activities in mind for the future which will include Nordic Walking, boxercise, games mornings, visits from dieticians and hopefully a seminar.

The group are asking for grant funding for hall hire and card readers so that the uncertain amount of money they might receive (based on people turning up on the day and paying £5) can help make the sessions and group more sustainable for the future, as they are becoming more well known. They have many ideas of fundraising which they will start to put into action in the coming months.

The card readers will ensure the group can make paying more accessible.

The group are contributing £100 of their own money toward the project.



Districtwide Community Updates

- Co-ordinating various local and district wide Network Groups including Youth Action, Food Provision, Arts and Culture and Green and Growing Group.
- Coordinating voluntary support response to Asylum Seekers based in North Herts.
- Continuing to facilitate NHC Councillors' Community Surgeries.
- Sharing and disseminating information on social media and to mailing lists, keeping in touch with the community, voluntary, statutory, and non-statutory agencies.
- The team have a budget of £210,000 from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) to use for applications for grant funding of between £5,000 and £20,000. The deadline for applications was midnight on 1st September. Successful applicants should receive funding by the end of October, to be spent by end of March 2025.

Area Community Updates

- Have met with local village halls, groups and Parish Councils to discuss future projects, any internal funding streams and external opportunities to support them.
- Continuing to attend Parish Council meetings to make closer links with the parishes.
